### From the desk of our Lay Ecclesial Leader...

I hope you are enjoying a good start to the new year. I am back from leave refreshed and recharged for what is going to be a busy 2024. Last year, we planned. This year, we will act in line with our vision to connect with the wider world and to be hospitable and generous so that all may live life to the full. This fits in well with the overall vision we share with St Gregory's to be a vibrant and vital community that intentionally reaches out to bring people to Jesus Christ.

In February and March, we are running the Alpha pilot, beginning on Saturday 3 February, and the Landings program, beginning on 21 February. Put simply, with these programs we are reaching out to our parish and the broader community and giving people an opportunity to come closer to God and/or to re-engage with their faith through well tested interactive programs that facilitate conversation, reflection and fellowship.

What is Alpha?

**Alpha** is an opportunity for people to share a meal, ask questions about important matters of life, faith and meaning and, in the search for the answer, come to know Jesus and grow closer to God.

There are 21 participants across the two parishes in our Alpha pilot expertly supported by Mary Ryan from the Archdiocese Proclaim team. I'm delighted we received such a positive response and enthusiasm for this program. If you want to learn more about Alpha, please contact me or Fr Charles.

What is Landings?

*Landings* offers a safe space for those who have disconnected from their faith to share their experiences. The informal meetings over a coffee and cake are all about compassionate listening: to welcome and encourage people to re-engage with their faith. The meetings are run by lay people.

The program begins on 21 February: there are 8 weekly sessions on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 8.30 pm. If you know of any inactive Catholics who may be interested in discussing their faith and/or are considering returning to the faith, please put them in touch with me or Ana Saro for more information.

Finally, I would like to extend a very warm welcome to Fr Isaac Zaki who joins our parish and St Gregory's parish as assistant priest to Fr Charles. Fr Isaac is new to Australia; he is learning about life in Melbourne and in our parish with enthusiasm. He is settling in well. I know you will make him feel welcome. A warm welcome and hospitality are what our parish does best!

We will be conducting a weekly Lenten Program in St Kevin's Chapel commencing on Thursday, 15<sup>th</sup> February, directly after the 9.15am morning Mass, and will continue every week during Lent. This program will be guided by our Lay Ecclesial Leader, Tiziana D'Costa, who will be using the Lenten Program booklet written by a variety of theologians. The booklet will be provided for you all to use during the Lenten Program or for you to study at home if you are not able to attend every session.

Meditation is credited with inducing a heightened state of awareness. Various studies demonstrate the practice can help relieve stress, manage anxiety, reduce inflammation, improve memory and attention. Meditation is not the time to worry about what is happening. It is a time of self-forgetfulness while focussing on the sacred word: the mantra MARANATHA, "Come Lord" in Aramaic, language spoken by Jesus. As you begin, trust that it will work for you.

### 2024 - Gloom or Hope?

**Fresh** from Christmas, the start of a New Year, and Chinese New Year shortly, it's natural now to feel somewhat joyful and optimistic. But at the same time the painful reality of a troubled world and society, and those with significant special needs, remain to haunt us. In the First Gospel Reading this weekend prophet Job does an excellent job expressing gloom. However balance also calls for context, time, hope and action. We can however start with recent appreciation expressed by St Kevin's 2nd collection beneficiaries. Extracts from (Catholic) Bethlehem University in the West Bank of the occupied Palestinian territories, uniquely attended by both Palestinian and Israeli students, say "On behalf of the faculty, staff, and students of Bethlehem University, I would like to acknowledge with deep gratitude the most generous gift of AUD 243.20 received from Templestowe Parish through Catholic Mission Australia.....During this heartbreaking and difficult time here at Bethlehem University, we continue to foster peace and stay focused on our educational mission. We believe that the city of Bethlehem will always remain a source of hope.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME				
First Reading	Second Reading			
Job 7: 1-4. 6-7	<u>1 Corinthians 9: 16-19. 22-23</u>			
A reading from the book of Job	A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians			
I am filled with sorrow all day long.	Punishment will come to me if I do not preach the Gospel.			
The very size of the book (42 chapters), let alone the fundamental question with which it wrestles, would have given the book of Job claim for significant representation in the lectionary. Alas, that is not the case at all. In three years there are just two short extracts, one for today and another for the Twelfth Sunday this year. The latter is rarely heard because the vagaries of the Lent and Easter seasons severely limit the observance of Sundays 7- 12. More's the pity, then, that today's text is an unrelieved lament at the joylessness of human life. Job bewails the utter drudgery of existence. It is nothing more than a hopeless repetition of days and nights that offer no relief from toil and grief. These are sentiments found also in the book of Ecclesiastes (Qoheleth), but there they are offset by sunny breaks. Even the connection with the gospel is tenuous. Today's reading from Mark does acknowledge sickness and demonic possession, but in the context of Jesus' power to heal. It bears good news, not bad. The upshot is that we get no glimpse of the poetry, power and beauty of the book of Job. Even though it doesn't resolve the problem of suffering, it does take us to heights as well as depths along the way.	From consideration of marriage, virginity and sexuality in chapter 7, Paul turns to the controversial issue of food offered to idols. The Corinthians have sought his advice as to whether it was permissible for them to eat it or not. The lectionary omits all of the short chapter 8 that introduces the problem, and also much of chapter 9 in which Paul asserts his apostolic authority. Today's reading picks up the concluding stage of his argument where he plays with the notion of freedom. As we discover from his letters, Paul is not averse to boasting. Here his claim is that he proclaims the gospel for free. Ironically, he first declares that he himself is not free. He has no choice but to preach – it is his sacred duty. But by not charging for this service, unlike other preachers and teachers of his time, he is free of the obligations that fees might entail. This in turn allows him to choose to be unfree, that is, to be "the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could." This is not a strategy of ingratiating himself with different classes of people for the sake of social acceptance. It's a missionary tactic "to save some at any cost." Paul is in argumentative mode here, justifying his methods. He wants to get the Corinthians to understand the freedom he enjoys and how he chooses to exercise it. He will go on to apply this to the question they have posed. Careful examination of how Paul develops his case will pay dividends for readers and the assembly alike.
