### A word from our Lay Ecclesial Leader...

### **Reconciliation Week**

As Catholics we understand reconciliation better than most people in society. We know it is vital to reconcile with God regularly: to acknowledge our mistakes, to ask for forgiveness and to forgive those who hurt us. We know this is a work in progress: it takes effort, patience and God's help to be the best possible Christian version of oneself.

Given our own struggles, we can recognise the truth in Bishop Gauci's words: reconciliation with our Indigenous brothers and sisters is an ongoing journey. There has been much that needs to be healed: injustice, discrimination and dispossession.

Bishop Gauci is the Chair of the Bishops Commission for Relations with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People. He spoke recently to mark Reconciliation Week.

The best Christian version of oneself calls for commitment towards reconciliation, mutual respect and equality with our First Nations People. Bishop Gauci says: 'this journey is not easy... Love demands sacrifices – it's about giving, respecting, and wanting the absolute best for others...We need to prayerfully reflect, be guided by the Holy Spirit, listen to each other with respect, and walk together to find the best way forward.' The bishop's last words should especially resonate with us as he urges fellow Catholics to embrace a synodal approach to reconciliation. At St Kevin's, we already embrace synodality as a way to be church! There is much we can do to model this approach for others along the journey of reconciliation.

Mass will be celebrated at St Gregory the Great Church, 71 Williamsons Road, Doncaster at 9.00am on this day.



### REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR THE FEAST THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

### First Reading Second Reading

### Exodus 24:3-8

A reading from the book of Exodus

This is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you.

The covenant ritual described in today's reading from the book of Exodus marks a significant moment in God's relationship with the people of ancient Israel. It is also an indispensable key to help Christians interpret Jesus' actions at his farewell meal.

The scene is vividly described. The people are gathered at the foot of Mt Sinai. Moses spells out God's terms for them to be divinely chosen, protected and blessed. The unanimous consent they declare is confirmed in a powerful ritual. An altar is built to represent the twelve tribes of Israel. Bullocks are sacrificed in God's honour, and their blood is cast on both the altar and the people to signify the sacred bond between them and their Lord. What gives this action its force is Israel's profound reverence for blood as the essence of life.

This unique Old Testament episode is alluded to in the gospel accounts of the Last Supper and elaborated on by the author of the letter to the Hebrews, as we are about to see.

### <u>Hebrews 9:11-15</u>

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

The blood of Christ will purify our inner selves.

The letter to the Hebrews is a rich but challenging text for contemporary Christians. It presents a sustained theological argument in high rhetorical style while assuming familiarity with Old Testament ritual traditions. All this makes an isolated extract like today's very difficult to digest without careful study.

The author clearly has the blood ritual described in the first reading in mind, even if the lectionary passage doesn't extend as far as the explicit reference a few verses later. The key point the writer makes is that by the shedding of his blood in self-sacrifice Christ has definitively restored us to covenant relationship with the living God once and for all. This contrasts sharply with the ineffectiveness of Old Testament atonement and purification rituals. Even a thorough knowledge of these rituals doesn't clarify all the questions raised by this dense text, such as how Christ's self-offering actually accomplishes our redemption.

### "Now more than ever"

This is the 2024 theme for Reconciliation week, from 27 May to 3 June. As Reconciliation Australia reminds us "no matter what", the fight for justice and the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander people will - and must continue. CatholicCare Tasmania has just created a new principal Aboriginal consultant role and appointed Ms Alarna Page to help preserve culture and improve outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members. She provides strategic advice and guidance, working with teams to help ensure cultural sensitivity and respect. She also delivers training, engages with Aboriginal services and communities, and identifies cultural and specific needs of young Aboriginal people, considering intergenerational trauma and social complexities. Historical understanding she says is critical to all this. Separately, In a new book published only last week "Mistakes and lessons from the voice referendum" Fr Frank Brennan says that The Voice to Parliament referendum result was a disaster for the country and a tragedy for First Australians. It's time to confront what went wrong before we all start forgetting what really went on he said in a CathNews report. His book offers an approach ahead for reversing reconciliation failure
