From the desk of Fr Charles...

Holidays:

On Monday I leave for a long-awaited holiday for three weeks. I shall be sightseeing around SE Australia with friends, including some places I've never visited. It should be fun, and the weather is cool but fine for the most part at this time of year so ideal for hiking. Fr Isaac will be filling in for most of my duties while I am away so most daily Masses will be celebrated as usual (possibly not during the week of the Clergy Conference in early June).

I leave you in good hands: Fr Isaac, Tiziana, Ana, Nadia, and our supply priests Bishop Les and Fr Gerry. I shall miss you, but not enough to spoil the beauty I am off to discover.

Feast of the Most Holy Trinity:

As I grew up I remember homilies starting with "it is very hard to describe the Trinity" – think of a three leafed clover; think of a triangle; the most humorous attempt I remember is "Trinity: three persons in one God: but just remember: three doesn't mean three, person doesn't mean person, in doesn't mean in, one doesn't mean one and God doesn't mean God." Hopefully I can do better in my homily than being dismissive of this most wonderful feast.

My reason for raising the feast in my words for the bulletin is to highlight the change that happened in the early church: they went from talking about Jesus, talking about the Spirit; talking about the Father or God: they went from that to seeing the truth of the Trinity. Christ Jesus remains central, the Good News he proclaims remains absolute – but ... their understanding of some fundamental truths developed over time. Always consistent with the past but developing in depth and scope.

We are going through a period of development in the church in Australia: today. All the old truths remain valid. But ... very few people have ears that can hear. We are on a journey that includes becoming synodal (walking with each other and listening as we seek to understand each other, each other's views, and remain open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit); working collaboratively; working in co-responsible teams; discerning the future rather than trusting that the Parish Priest knows all the answers. Development like this led to expression of the doctrine of the Most Holy Trinity, long after the Gospels were written including only allusions to the Trinity.

If you feel a little at sea with our faith, our church at present: that's Ok: trust, remain open to God's love. And marvellous things will happen in our parish.

The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This feast celebrates the Virgin Mary's visit to her cousin Elizabeth, as to told in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 1:39-56), and her example of faith in God's word and sensitivity to the Spirit.

It was introduced into the Franciscan calendar by Saint Bonaventure (15 July) in the thirteenth century and was extended in 1389 to the entire Latin Church to heal the division in the Western Church of the time.

National Reconciliation Week – 27 May – 3 June 2024

About the theme

The National Reconciliation Week theme for 2024, **Now More Than Ever**, is a reminder to all of us that no matter what, the fight for justice and the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people will —and must —continue.

In case we didn't notice it, the week of 16 -24 May was Refugee Week!

Last year at our invitation Sr Brigid Arthur of the Brigidine Asylum Seekers Project addressed a well-attended St Kevin's Parish Social Justice Action online Forum (around 50 from our and some other neighbouring Parishes) on the Project, and the issues it advocates for, and asylum seekers it caringly supports with the help of volunteers.

Sr Brigid recently turned 90 and is showing no signs of slowing down in her extraordinary work, firmly based on our faith values and its human care for others. On Wednesday I and many other accepted an invitation from Sr Brigid to attend a presentation by the Human Rights Law Centre, and discussion, on the current situation concerning recent associated High Court decisions, and proposed legislation - The Migration Amendment (Removal and Other Measures) Bill 2024. The Bill was introduced in Federal Parliament in March, but voting on the Bill has been delayed. Between now and the next federal election a year or so away there is likely to be much discussion on immigration, refugees, asylum seekers, infrastructure, and more.

Second Reading

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR THE MOST HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY

First Reading

Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

The Lord himself is God in heaven above and on earth below: there is no other.

Moses' solemn words to the Israelites invite them into a vast panorama, stretching from the dawn of creation, through the exodus from Egypt to an open future in which 'you and your children may prosper and live long in the land.' Moses is intent on reminding the people of the identity and power of the one true God. To this God alone are they called to pledge faithful allegiance.

He highlights God's own word, first evoking the creation story with which the book of Genesis begins. Through the six active days of creation God spoke and elements of the world came to be, culminating in the birth of humankind. God spoke again 'from the heart of the fire' on Mt Sinai and gave the Israelites the Law, the Torah, by which they were to live. Now Moses summons them to take this word to heart, for 'The Lord is God indeed, in heaven above as on earth beneath, he and no other.'

This reading sums up the astonishing revelation that led ancient Israel to believe in one and only one God, beyond naming and human imagination yet passionately involved with the world.

Romans 8:14-17

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

You have received the Spirit that makes you God's own children,
and in that Spirit we call God: Father, our Father!

The good news conveyed by this short passage from Romans is Trinitarian. It declares that as children we can address God as 'Abba, Father'. We are co-heirs with Christ and moved by the Spirit. This snapshot of our Christian identity is heart-warming, yet its import may be obscured by our sensitivity to the exclusive language of the Jerusalem Bible lectionary.

More contemporary translations like the NRSV avoid the use of the words 'son' and 'sons'. It may seem perfectly apt to replace these with 'children', but it should be noted that this choice does entail some loss. The linguistic connection with Jesus as 'Son of God' is diminished, as is the sense of privilege given to the baptised as it was to sons in ancient times.

What Paul writes to the Romans echoes what Jesus said to his disciples after he had washed their feet: 'I shall not call you servants any more...I shall call you friends' (Jn 15:15). It also alludes to the risen Lord countering his disciples' fear with greetings of peace (eg Jn20:19-21).

My neighbour took his life rather than face homelessness. Will Anyone bother to notice?

We lost one of our neighbours the other day. He climbed over the balcony railing and threw himself from the top floor of his apartment building onto the ground below. He'd been in that unit for 23 years and was a regular sight to all of us living in the little cluster of towers in Sydney's Kings Cross, as he sat on a chair on his open balcony, watching the world go by ... But last week, the world no longer passed by; it stopped right at his door. His nine-level building of 35 cheap rented studios, he learnt, is about to be torn down and redeveloped into a flashy new one of just 12 luxury three-bedroom apartments. He was set to be evicted, and homeless. This is the real face of the housing crisis: a middle-aged, lonely man, battling to survive on a low income, who felt he'd run out of options. This neighbourhood was his home, everyone he knew and everything he did was here ... What options can we in St Kevin's parish offer those in need? Do we notice those in need? We know an elderly lady and former Knitting Group member, now in Croydon, in urgent need of rental accommodation - John Costa. SJA
