A word from the Lay Ecclesial Leader...

When my children were small, during car trips, they would inevitably ask 'are we there yet?' This was usually pretty early on in the trip, say in the first 20 minutes of a two-hour car journey. As small children, they did not have a conception of time. Typically, I encouraged them to be patient, to trust that the journey would be pleasant, and that the destination was worth waiting for.

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus compares the Kingdom of God to a fruitful harvest. We are called to be the farmers who sow the seed night and day. We do not know when the harvest will come; but we need to have faith and keep sowing. There's no point asking, 'are we there yet'? Because sowing for the kingdom of God is a steady and constant process. We may never even see the fruit of what we sow. But there will be fruit, even from unexpected places. As Jesus says, even the smallest mustard seed can grow into the biggest shrub.

A letter to Clergy and Laity of the Archdiocese of Melbourne

Archbishop Peter A Comensoli recently returned from a pilgrimage of solidarity to the Holy Lands of Israel, the Palestinian Territories and Lebanon. In a letter to the clergy and laity of the Archdiocese, he says the pilgrimage 'allowed for significant opportunities in prayer, engagement and learning through that part of the world where, in the past, Christ walked and ministered, and where, today, the great Abrahamic religions and historical cultures live side-by-side, in very complex, and presently tragic ways'. In all this tragic complexity, he says, 'there are nonetheless signs of hope, actions of goodness and people of welcome and hospitality.'




When coming to Church, please make sure you don't park too close to the Church building.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Second Reading

Ezekiel 17: 22-24

A reading from the prophet Ezekiel

I have made the small tree great.

This oracle from the prophet Ezekiel appeals to our visual imagination. The divine voice invites us to picture a seedling of cedar being planted on the top of a high mountain. There it thrives until it becomes a towering tree. A multitude of birds finds shelter in its outspread branches. In sketching this scene so simply yet vividly for us, Israel's Lord communicates his sovereign power.

The challenge for both reader and assembly is to make sense of a text that has no context. Even those who tune in quickly to its evocative style are likely to find themselves puzzled. The curious who check it out will find that this short reading concludes a kind of parable that takes up the whole of chapter 37 in the book of Ezekiel. It's a complex piece of story-telling that interprets how Jerusalem was overrun by the Babylonians around the year 587 BC. God is the key player in the drama, along with the king of Babylon, the kings of Judaea and the Pharoah of Egypt, none of whom are named. It's a story of the inter-play of divine and human agency.

None of this background is provided for the praying community. The reason for the reading's selection will only become clear when the gospel story of the mustard seed is read.

<u> 2 Corinthians 5: 6-10</u>

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Whether we are living in the body or exiled from it, we are intent on pleasing the Lord.

Paul's reflections on the trials and struggles of his apostolic mission have led him to view them in the light of the glory to come. In today's passage he uses a spatial rather than a temporal metaphor. It is based on seeing heaven as our true homeland. Our earthly life is thus one of exile. While in exile on earth, we walk by faith; when we reach our destiny, we shall see.

Paul unites heaven and earth by declaring that, wherever we are, we are full of confidence and are determined to please God. This reference to pleasing God gives rise to another image, that of "the law court of Christ," where we will be judged for the good or bad things we have done.

Paul's mind is so fertile that it is easy to be disoriented by the flow of his ideas. Today's reading is short but busy.

Mark's Seeds

As today's familiar Gospel reading from Mark describes, mustard seeds are thrown on some land, and somehow over time sprout of their own accord. When a crop appears, a harvest is ready to be reaped, or left to wither. This relates well to the Mission our faith calls us to carry on. Throwing seeds is the easy part, following up is harder. Our Parish provides many opportunities to follow up, not only by donating money, although that clearly helps, but also by simple practical activities of various kinds, doing what we can personally and collectively to help those in need, homeless, abused, without opportunity, and forgotten, and to stand for equality and justice. Being conscious of the many needs around us is a good start, and there are many opportunities for doing this by reading widely, including within our Parish. In a small way Social Justice Action attempts to help through Parish Newsletters and Website. How often do we read the Newsletter after Mass or visit the regularly updated Website? More directly, those able to assist are welcome to join in St Kevin's Social Justice Action events, and other Parish groups, to help ensure that seeds which sprout aren't allowed to wither. A *Synodal* Church for *all of the People of God in our Parish and Archdiocese working together*, is a wonderful new opportunity to do what the very early Church did, if it can *again come to pass*
