Words From the Desk of our PP...

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord: I find it intriguing and wonderful how God, through his only begotten Son Christ Jesus of Nazareth, takes what has been and grows it to fullness. Our Lady, Mary, goes to the temple to complete her ritual purification after 40 days. Mary and Joseph take Jesus to the temple to offer him as required: the first fruits of the womb are to be offered to God. God takes these to rules of the Mosaic Law (which at its core was given by God) and adds to them by having Simeon and Anna there: and they announce that God has come among us. Wow! As I prepare for the weekend, I am struck by the way God helps us to grow and grow again out of the (good) learnings and practices we already have.

<u>Alpha:</u> We have sufficient confirmed participants for three full tables, so we are not accepting any further registrations for the current experience. We will of course accept expressions of interest for the next Alpha which will start in August. We are getting sufficient interest from younger people that we are beginning the process of planning an Alpha for youth. Thank you for your prayers and your support helping Alpha become an on-going element of how we become welcoming, invitational, and evangelising as a natural part of living our discipleship, along with our devotion and celebration of Mass and living like Christ in all aspects of our lives (well, seeking to do so).

<u>Schools</u>: Welcome back to all our school children and their families. I have seen some of the faces of the children as they arrive at school, and they seem excited to be coming to learn more. I look forward to hearing from my Granddaughter on Monday what her first day at school was like.

<u>Parish Pastoral Council</u>: Our first Parish Pastoral Council meeting will be held on the coming Tuesday (St Greg's) Thursday (St Kevin's). Please keep us in your prayers as we seek to develop a clear set of actions we can take to continue along the path of spreading the Good News and building our capacity to be disciples who collectively enact the three elements of Christ's call: to worship Father-Son-Holy Spirit / to help the poor and marginalised and to bring the Good News to all peoples by going and making disciples of all people.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

First Reading Second Reading

Malachi 3: 1-4

A reading from the prophet Malachi

The Lord whom you seek will come to his temple.

Malachi means 'my messenger'. It is a short anonymous prophesy of the 5th century BC that calls for God to purify the people. A messenger will prepare the way of the Lord; this opening sentence is an allusion to John the Baptist. Then the Lord will enter the Temple suddenly. The liturgy applies this text to Jesus the Messiah who today appears in the Temple. Malachi looks forward to a new beginning, a prophesy ultimately to be fulfilled in Christ. The messiah will purify and refine, to use Malachi's metallurgic imagery. This reading poses a great challenge. Its meaning is not transparent and the phrases are obscure for both the reader and the assembly: "angel of the covenant", "the day of his coming", "refiner's fire", "fuller's alkali", "sons of Levi", "the offering of Judah and Jerusalem".

The key message is that the Lord is to come unexpectedly to his Temple. The gospel will take up this theme, paradoxically in fact, for the Lord comes not in power and might but in poverty and weakness.

Hebrews 2: 14-18

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews *He had to be made like us in all things.*

Like the text from Malachi, this passage from the letter to the Hebrews is neither easy for readers to proclaim nor for the assembly to understand. It begins with a long and difficult sentence.

The argument goes like this. Jesus has become a human being and so shares human flesh and blood and even human temptation.

Consequently, his triumph over the power of death/evil (on the cross) is a victory for the whole human race. As a compassionate high priest (at the altar of the cross) he is able to atone for human sin. The text contains a message of consolation and salvation for all. The reading makes an important connection between the incarnation and the cross. We will see this recur in the Gospel when the child of forty days is held by Simeon in the Temple.

Fr Anton Aseervathampillai: New Assistant Priest:

On 15th February we will welcome a new Assistant Priest for St Greg's and St Kevin's. Here below follows a brief biography in his own words:

"My name is Fr. Anton Punithakumar Aseervathampillai, but I go by Fr Anton. I was born on 4th September 1973 in Mullaitivu, the northern part of Sri Lanka. After having completed my Philosophy and Theology at St Francis Xavier's Major Seminary, Jaffna, Sri Lanka, I was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Jaffna on 23rd April 2005.

I served for 3 years as an assistant priest before serving as a parish priest for 12 years in three different parishes. I came to Melbourne on 16th March 2020 as a chaplain to the Tamil speaking people from Sri Lanka, India, Malaysia and Singapore who live in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. I served for 5 years as a part-time assistant priest of St Andrew's Parish, Werribee. Serving in Doncaster & Templestowe will be my second appointment as a part-time assistant priest in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. I am so thrilled to be with you serving in ministry. As I begin my ministry with you, could I kindly request your continuous support and prayers to be a good and worthy servant of God."

Where might the world and our Church be heading?

What do we think of the world today, and how might we imagine it just 25 years ahead? What might we do today for people suddenly forced to leave their land, homes, and families because of war, poverty or politics? How do we address homelessness, lack of opportunity, physical and mental ill-health today, and what do we project for all these ahead? What does inequality for First nations peoples look like now and what might this become ahead? How do we address injustice? How will we address Climate change? We're now also starting to sample the power of artificial intelligence, what might this look like 25 years away? Luckily we're not alone, but how might we work together to help build a better world for everyone? As a Parish what do you and I think of all these things now? - John Costa, SJA
