Pope appoints religious sister to run Vatican City State

The Vatican has confirmed that Franciscan Sister of the Eucharist Raffaella Petrini, secretary-general of the office governing Vatican City State and already the highest ranking woman at the Vatican, will become the next president of the office. She will assume the role on 1 March when current president Cardinal Fernando Vérgez Alzaga steps down on his 80th birthday.

Pope Francis said that the process of women being given leadership roles in the Roman Curia 'is something that has gone slowly', but would continue with Sr Petrini talking over the governor's office.






The next **St Kevin's Men's Social Group** takes place on **Friday**, **14**th **March @ 7.30pm in the Church Gathering Space**.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

1 Samuel 26: 2. 7-9. 12-13. 22-23

A reading from the first book of Samuel

The Lord has put you in my power, but I will not raise my hand against you.

The first two kings of Israel were Saul and David. The king was God's anointed and ruled over God's people. However, both Saul and David are presented as flawed human beings, though this reading shows David in a favourable light.

Saul grows increasingly erratic with the passing years and becomes jealous of the younger and more successful David. In this passage, as he is being pursued by Saul, David has the opportunity to assassinate his rival and seize power, but he chooses not to repay injustice with vengeance. The final sentence which explains this choice portrays David as a forerunner of Christ.

The broken verses of chapter 26 indicate that this is a shortened version of the story. It is worth reading the whole to get a fuller sense of what is happening. Still, the story as we have it is clear and dramatic. David and Abishai sneak into the camp in the dark: no one saw, no one knew, no one woke up...

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 15: 45-49

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Just as we have carried the earthly image, we must carry the heavenly image.

For once, we really need this reading to be longer. Verses 40-44 make sense of this text: There are heavenly bodies and earthly bodies... it is the same with the resurrection of the dead: what is sown is corruptible, but what is raised is incorruptible; it is sown in contempt but raised in glory; it is sown in weakness but raised in power; it is sown a physical body and it is raised a spiritual body... Then follows the parallel between the first Adam and Christ (the second Adam), between the one fashioned from earth and the one come down from heaven. In brief, Paul is saying that we who are fashioned in the image of the earthly Adam will be refashioned in the image of the heavenly one; by our resurrection, we shall be like the risen Christ in glory.

The reading is short but difficult to follow.

Faith Values, Reasoning & Social Justice?

Many US Catholics among others reportedly achieved their voting objective with the outcome of recent US Elections. Relating to that, an 18 February 2025 commentary "Rationalizing Trump" in Commonweal Magazine by Gillis J. Harp (author, most recently, of Protestants and American Conservatism: A Short History, Oxford University Press, 2019), includes the following thought provoking paragraphs:......"Evangelical support for Donald Trump in the face of his many well-documented personal failings can no longer come as a surprise. Despite—or, in at least some cases, one suspects, because of—his numerous criminal indictments and thirty-four felony convictions in New York, exit polls found that around 82 percent of white Evangelicals voted for the Trump/Vance ticket. This was in line with the roughly 80 percent who backed Trump in 2016 and 2020. "....."Decades ago, Archbishop Fulton Sheen assailed the consequentialist reasoning he saw at the core of the decision to use the atomic bomb. To him, it signalled the beginning of the end of moral constraints on human behaviour. "The dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima blotted out boundaries," Sheen concluded. "There was no longer a boundary between the military and the civilian, between the helper and the helped, between the wounded and the nurse and the doctor... [W]e broke down boundaries and limits and from that time on the world has said we want no one limiting me." Trump's Evangelical supporters have similarly refused to let traditional ethics limit their political ambitions. The path they've chosen is truly a perilous one." - John Costa, SJA
