Words From the Desk of our PP...

#### **Easter:**



Alleluia, Alleluia, HE IS RISEN!!! Thank you for your presence, your faith, your following of Christ through Lent and through Holy Week: through Jesus' Passion, Death and Resurrection. Thank you to everyone who helped with preparing for Lent and Holy Week – there are dozens and dozens of people who contribute in some way: thank you all.

Our lives utterly depend on this miracle of redemption and the opening of the path of salvation in Christ Jesus. Because of Easter Baptism is more than a sign it is a true change of who we are: we become part of the Body of Christ. Let us enter joyfully into the fifty days of the Easter Season. Let us journey from Resurrection to Ascension and Pentecost with hearts filled with Hope!

Let us make this journey seeking once again to grow in how we live out the three faces of the Mission that Jesus entrusts to us: the mission to more and more joyfully and deeply worship God as Father Son and Holy Spirit; the mission to go and help the poor, sick, imprisoned, etc; and the mission to go and make disciples.

As we celebrate the glory of the Resurrection, let us open our hearts to grow in faith, hope and charity and open our minds to finding or continuing ways to spread the Good News.

#### **Mass Offerings:**

Isn't it nice to find oneself following what is sensible and is also 'the rules.' Clearly in some parts of the world priests are trying to mis-use the practice of offering Mass for deceased family members. One of the departments of the Roman Curia has just issued a document emphasising the guidelines around Mass offerings, and we comply as a matter of course.

Basically: recommended offering for a Mass is up to \$25 but you can make whatever offering you wish. Three things follow from that offering: First the name of the deceased will be included with a specific Mass and mentioned during the Eucharistic Prayer (not during Last Supper, Easter Vigil or Christmas Eve). Second, if you give more than \$25 I shall arrange for additional Masses to be said (one for every \$25 or part thereof). Third, if you request, the person will be included in the names for recent deaths or anniversaries of death.

For the additional Masses they accumulate faster than Fr Anton and I can offer Masses so I will arrange for the additional Masses to be said by Aid to the Church in Need in which case your offering goes to a worthy charitable cause.

As a side matter, I offer the Masses in the order the requests are received so sometimes the exact date of an anniversary is not available so I allocate the next nearest date – we do not offer Mass for two separate requests at the same time. occasionally there can be a bit of a mix up for which I apologise.

God bless, Fr Charles. Alleluia, Alleluia!!!

#### HOLY LAND COLLECTION - GOOD FRIDAY APRIL 18th 2025

This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment, housing. Due to the ongoing war, the Church and people of the Holy Land are still struggling with reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world. In 2024 Australian Catholics were once again extremely generous and we were able to send to the Holy Land nearly \$1.5 million (\$1.4 million [2023], \$1.4 million [2022] and \$1,126,098 [2021]). The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges, financial and spiritual, and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday.

#### REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF **EASTER SUNDAY**

#### First Reading

#### Acts of the Apostles 10:34. 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

The Acts of the Apostles is a continuation of the Gospel of Luke. It tells the story of the early Church where we see a wonderful widening of the circle: the message of Christ is meant for all nations. Luke's gospel ends with a final instruction from the risen Lord: In the name of the risen Lord, repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be preached to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this... (Lk 24:47-48). How this comes to pass is the subject matter of the Acts of the Apostles.

So here in this text, we see Peter preaching the resurrection not to the Jewish community but to the household of Cornelius, a pagan Roman centurion. Peter's proclamation stands in stark contrast to the account of the resurrection that we will hear in the gospel. Here we have a direct, excited and forthright eye-witness account of Jesus' ministry, death and resurrection. All are called to believe in Jesus and have their sins forgiven.

### **Second Reading**

#### Colossians 3:1-4

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.

Today's second reading contrasts heaven and earth. The previous chapter has referred to our baptism as a dying and rising with Christ. That is the context for understanding this passage. In our baptism we have come to new life with Christ as part of God's family. The reading ends with the promise of glory with the risen Christ and tries to evoke the radiance of the resurrection which all the baptised are called to share.

#### **Easter Reflection - Triumph of life over death**

(The following extracts are from Easter Triumph of life over Death, Paul Collins, John Menadue.com, 16 April 2025)

".....how do we make sense of Easter? For believers, Easter is about the death and resurrection of Christ. Of the two, death is the easier to grasp. It's fundamental to life and, as we get older, we're increasingly conscious of its proximity. And, in a world where so many people are deliberately or casually killed in Gaza, Myanmar, Ukraine, DR Congo and elsewhere, we are constantly reminded of the fragility of life. Resurrection is much harder to comprehend. For me, it is summed up in a simple phrase from the requiem mass: "Lord, for your faithful people life is changed, not ended." However, it's easy to assert the continuity of life, but what is the nature of that change?"......"In the 2015 encyclical letter Laudato si', Pope Francis says, "Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves, or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature." Francis radically re-situates and re-roots us in the natural material world. He is particularly critical of the loss of biodiversity: "Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such Fundamentally, Easter is about the triumph of material life over death and disintegration. Teilhard de Chardin speaks of "the spiritual power of matter" and it is in, and through, our material existence in nature that we most truly experience God." -John Costa SJA
